FireFighters Burn Institute Memorial

The FireFighters Burn Institute is a nonprofit 501 (c)3 Organization founded by Sacramento Fire Captain Cliff Haskell and the Sacramento area firefighters, Local 522 in 1973, for the purpose of establishing a local burn treatment facility and providing recovery programs for burn survivors. The program also provides fire and burn prevention through public education. The FireFighters Burn Institute also provides funding for education for medical burn team professionals, firefighters and burn survivors. They also support burn treatment and rehabilitation research in the Sacramento area.

History

In 1972 a jet airplane, attempting to take off from the Sacramento Executive Airport during an air show, crashed into a crowded Farrell's ice cream parlor killing 22 people and burning many others. A Sacramento firefighter, Gene Levine and eight other members of his family, died in this fiery crash.

This memorial is to honor Cliff Haskell, who, shortly after the crash, headed the FireFighters Burn Institute for the next 26 years. The Institute was initially established by the Sacramento Area Firefighters and Local 522. Cliff Haskell, a captain with the Fire Department at the time, was named Executive Director shortly thereafter.

Due to the Institute's efforts, the University of California Davis Medical Center (UCDMC) Regional Burn Center opened its doors in January of 1974, as well as other facilities like the Shriners Hospital, which is located in the same area. The FireFighters Burn Institute and firefighters of Sacramento have been instrumental in the planning and implementation of all programs. The firefighters' involvement has been a hallmark of its success and for over forty-two years continues to step forward in taking the lead in the fundraising campaign for a new Regional Burn Center at the UC Davis Medical Center in Sacramento.

Since the summer of 2016, Washington Lodge # 20 has set-out to do something in the community that would revitalize its commitment in the Sacramento area worthy of its vision to better its community involvement. At that time, Senior Warden Victor Sanchez, Junior Warden Luis Montero and then Master of the Lodge, Scott Goode, were able to jointly form a committee to help the FireFighters Burn Institute erect a memorial in memory of Cliff Haskell and his many contributions to the burn victims, their families and the Sacramento area.

The committee wishes to invite members of Washington Lodge #20 to help bring about a transformation of the current FireFighters Burn Institute to the envisioned memorial area at its entrance.
