The Masonic Journey

It has been a long haul for both of you, my Brothers, although in completely different circumstances and pathways, but I am sure you will agree that it was all worth it. You now face a new chapter in your Masonic journey, my Brothers, and you will always have my full support. Many kudos!

These great results prove once again that Washington Lodge No. 20 provides a fantastic learning environment for Brethren who are serious in achieving their objectives. Brothers Workman and Stallberg, I have great pleasure in offering congratulations on your advancement to the Degrees of Master Mason and Fellow Craft Mason, respectively. There is still much to learn for sure. May you enjoy continued progress in the years ahead.

The undertaking of making proficiencies and receiving the various Degrees of Masonry has traditionally been considered in itself the ideal "Passport to Knowledge". These important steps (you are proficient; therefore, you may advance) can also be described as the key to a continuing journey of Masonic education.

Some say, however, while it may be accepted that it is an innermost desire to advance through Degrees, followed by Obligations that makes one a "true and lawful" member of the Craft, a man is never completely a Freemason until he truthfully and loyally lives up to his Obligations without equivocation or any reservation in his own mind.

If that is the case, how can one improve himself in Masonry? Scholars point out that a Mason cannot do that until he understands the true meaning of his Obligations, and eventually, following a Masonic program of education, he learns to know their scope and real meaning, duly and steadfastly observing its intrinsic solemnity.

One may seek to achieve "Masonic knowledge" by sitting in Lodge and listening to the ceremonies or attending a session of our District's Officers School of Instruction (O.S.I.), where the objective is primarily devoted to improve the performance of the ritualist, sometimes followed by team building exercises on leadership and administration of a lodge. Ritual is undoubtedly fundamental to our Craft, and its preservation in its purest form is the life's blood of our Fraternity, but it is not to be confused with Masonic education.

Freemasonry is monumental! Its rich history, tenets, traditions, landmarks, customs, symbolism and beautiful allegories - even its Constitution and its rules and regulations - just to mention a few - are to be studied and mastered by Brothers who are seeking Masonic knowledge, which, again, can be placed quite apart from his rightful ambition to become a good ritualist. An educated Freemason needs to have accomplished both!

And it is with that in mind that Worshipful **Michael Woo**, Inspector of the 414th Masonic District, is cordially inviting all members of Washington Lodge No. 20 to a very special presentation by Worshipful Dr. **Ric Berman**, Past Master of Quatuor Coronati Lodge No. 2076, the premier lodge of Masonic research, on Wednesday, April 22nd, at 7:00 PM. Dr. Ric Berman is a noted Masonic scholar and is an authority on 18th century Freemasonry in England and the United States. All three Masonic Youth Orders have their own leadership structures, chapters, and values. They also represent Masonic values in community service, compassion towards one another, and truth. These Orders help the youth of today grow to become better members of society like other youth groups such as Scouts and Girl Scouts. Our own ranks in Freemasonry are filled with former DeMolay men.

As Masons, it is our undeniable duty to provide mentorship to these Orders. Whether it's bowling or participating in community service with them, we must support these groups so they can flourish.


